Pebbles on the Shore Random Reflections from the Rector

There is a big and very prominent poster stuck to the wall of one of the churches in Dunfermline which, though I fully appreciate and support the reason it's there, I find rather disturbing.

The poster asks a very simple question: 'Does God exist?'
Possible answers are: 'Yes'; 'No'; 'probably'

Every time I see that poster I can't help muttering under my breath (or, sometimes, if I'm in the car and on my own, actually shouting out loud): 'Don't answer! It's a trick question!' Of course, it's not meant to be a trick question, but to my mind, it's a meaningless question, or at least one based on a faulty presupposition. The same question arose in St Andrew's Cathedral, Aberdeen, about 10 year ago at a service to celebrate Bruce Cameron's election as Primus of the Scottish Episcopal Church.

In that service, some of the young people of the diocese staged a version of 'Who Wants to be a Millionaire with Bruce as the contestant. He was asked several questions about the Church and his faith which inevitably required him to 'Ask the Audience' or 'Phone a Friend' at various points. Finally he was asked: 'Does God exist?' Bruce



thought for a while, and then decided he would ask the audience. And so, whilst the Who Wants to be a Millionaire music blared out in the background, members of the Cathedral congregation, including all the diocesan clergy, were asked to give their opinion as to whether or not God existed.

As you might expect, the answer was almost unanimously in favour of God's existence. Only one person had the courage to put his hand up and say that God did not exist though the fact that he was the Provost of the Cathedral, made his opinion somewhat more noteworthy than it might otherwise have been. In fact, most people thought he was joking, and laughed. But he wasn't joking. He was deadly serious and though I didn't have the courage to say so at the time, I agree with him. And, if I had a ladder and thought I could get away with it, I might climb up the wall of that Church in Dunfermline with the poster and paint a big red cross in the box next

to 'No'! And while I was up there, I would add another question to the poster. Next to 'Does God Exist?', I would add, 'Does God not exist?' Yes'; 'No'; 'Probably' and again put a cross in the 'No' box.
God neither exists nor not does not exist - and the arguments of those like Richard Dawkins and Christopher Hitches who try to 'prove' that God does not exist are every bit as meaningless as the arguments of Christians who assert that God does exist.

You may well by now be wondering what on earth I'm talking about: How can a Christian Priest think God doesn't exist? Isn't that sheer hypocrisy?

Well, the observant among you will have noticed that I have not said I don't believe in God, I have simply said I don't believe God exists (and neither do I believe God does not exist). My point is that it is simply not appropriate to apply the category or concept of 'existence' to God. 'Existence' is very much a 'thiswordly' category. Existence refers to objects around us, to things we can see or hear; to things we can perceive or experience in the world and in the universe. I exist, an elephant exists; a dodo does not exist, a black hole probably exists. But none of this applies to God. God is not an 'object' in the material world to be investigated; to be proved or disproved; God can not be

the object of rational enquiry or scientific methodology - he just isn't that kind of thing. In fact he's not a 'thing' at all, though when we speak of his existence or non-existence; when we try to prove or disprove it, that's what we reduce him to: a thing; an object.

At best, a god which 'existed' could be nothing more than a 'being' like us. Even if he were the 'supreme being' he would still be a 'being' like us. And surely, for Christians, God is somewhat more than that. So, the question: 'Does God exist?' simply isn't the right question. Better questions might include: 'What does the word 'God' mean to you?' 'Do you believe and trust in God?' 'Will you choose to be loyal to God?'

Liturgical Corner Part 2

The Eucharistic Vestments

The Alb

The Alb (from the Latin *albus* meaning 'white') is the simplest of vestments, and the foundation of the whole system. It derives from the tunic, the commonest garment of ancient times, a simple covering for the body with sleeves for the arms. Originally it reached only to the knees, but later, especially in the East, it was extended to the ankles. The tunic was usually made of wool, for warmth, but its derivation, the alb, is traditionally made of white linen, though many are made from man-made fabric nowadays. The alb is worn by all orders of clergy under the Eucharistic vestments, or under the cope. It can also be worn by others (including laypeople) who assist with the service (e.g., servers, etc)

The Girdle

The girdle is not a separate vestment, but an adjunct to the alb, being used to fasten it round the waist. It is usually a cord of white linen or hemp with tassels; but there are other forms, such as a band of coloured silk.

The Stole

The stole was originally a napkin or towel that servants carried on the left shoulder. As the deacon's duty was to cleanse the church's sacred vessels they naturally adopted this practice. Eventually the stole came to be folded into a long narrow strip of linen. Deacons still wear them over the left shoulder. Priests wear them over both shoulders - originally as scarves and not for cleansing.

The Maniple

The maniple (from the Latin *manipulus* which means 'folded together') was originally a handkerchief, worn over the left arm (or kept in the left hand) to wipe the face and hands. Like the stole it then developed into an ornamental vestment used symbolically during the celebration of the Eucharist to show acceptance of suffering. It ceased use in the Roman Catholic Church after the second Vatican Council in 1962, but is still to be found quite often in the Anglican Church, though it is not normally worn at Holy Trinity.

The Chasuble

The chasuble comes from the commonest over-garment of Roman times - a circular piece of cloth with a hole in the middle like a poncho. Giving rise to capes and cloaks, it was worn by clergy in and out of church. As a distinctive vestment it developed into bell-shaped, Gothic and fiddleback forms. It often incorporates strips of embroidery (orphreys) in the shape of a cross. It is the distinctive Eucharistic vestment worn in the Western Church only by the celebrant.
