It's sometimes, said, 'It takes all sorts!' This is often said a bit dismissively - perhaps of people whose behaviour or life-styles we don't exactly approve of, or of of people with whom we disagree.

Nevertheless, it's a very true statement. It does take all sorts - we live in a world of 'All Sorts' - and even in the church there are 'All Sorts'!

The truth is, people not all the same People have different shapes and sizes and genders, some are hairy, some are bald, some are clever, some are not, some are fat, some are thin, some are short, some are tall, there are different philosophies, religions, worldviews, different lifestyles, different values, different ways of thinking and different ways of doing thing!

In fact, one of the most amazing things about our world and particularly about human society, is that it's full of difference and contrast! This can have its drawbacks and lead sometimes to conflict, but it also surely makes things much more exciting and can lead to creativity and change as these differences rub



against each other!

There is, however, I suppose, some safety in 'sameness' - it's so much easier being with people who are 'like us'. Sociologists and anthropologists would tell us that a group of 'like' people has enormous power and is usually marked by its great resistance to those who are different in some way.

And so, people who are different to the 'norm' often have a hard time! Whether it be a different skin colour, or a different belief system, or a different sexual orientation or just a different way of dressing, the truth is that the majority of 'like' people find it hard to accept and integrate people who are different!

Why this should be, I don't know. Perhaps we need people 'like us' around us to make us feel secure and affirmed and accepted. But it is, surely, important that we do also engage and interact with

those who are different to ourselves - not in an attempt to convert them to our way of thinking, but so that we might learn from them and they from us, and that we might grow as human beings!!

Thanks to all who helped the event raise over £450 for church funds.



Progress of Implementation of the Diocesan Policy

The implementation of the new Diocesan Policy is moving ahead strongly.

The new Diocesan structure provides for an enlarged and more representative Standing Committee. The Standing Committee has already been enlarged by the addition of the Convenors of the five Policy and Action Groups. It will be enlarged by a further eight members, both clergy and lay, following election at the forthcoming Diocesan Synod. This will give us a stronger and much

more representative Standing Committee which will be able to carry forward business on behalf of the Diocese between meetings of the Diocesan Synod.

The five Policy and Action Groups have also come into being. The Convenors have been appointed:

Casting the Net - Karen Gaskell

Ministry - Canon Alison Peden

Children, Young People and their Parents - Rev Anne Haselhurst

Charges and Groupings – Ven Kenny Rathband

Administration - Dr John Ferguson-Smith

Members of all these groups have now agreed to serve and the groups are beginning to shape their programme for the future. An important early task is that of shaping the Job Descriptions and other information for the appointment of the three Diocesan Officers as outlined in the Diocesan Policy. Those posts will be advertised immediately following the meeting of the Standing Committee on 4 February. The development of the Casting the Net Group is of particular interest. The primary task of this group will be to encourage our congregations to take part in a review of their life against the Nine Marks of a Healthy Mission-Shaped church. This group will also be responsible for the way in which the whole programme is given identity and for the way in which it is launched. At the moment we are exploring the possibility that Casting the Net would be launched in every congregation on Pentecost Sunday. This may involve giving each congregation a net and other items which are sym-

bolic of the programme. We are then considering bringing together the whole Diocese in the Cathedral for a celebration on the eve of St Andrews Day.

The implementation of this programme is, of course, a major task but it is encouraging that so much progress has been made so quickly. We look forward to being able to begin to enrich the lives of our congregations as the programme develops.

Young Church News

The Young Church have at last got back to normal after a very busy time. Most of the children took part and thoroughly enjoyed being in the YF Pantomime, "Star Wars meets Sleeping Beauty." Connor and Rebecca C played the King and Queen, Iain was Darth Vader (the Wicked Fairy), and Rebecca F was "Just a Fairy". The others played little Stars and Royal Guests.

Wanted—Toiletries

Members of the Mothers Union group recently listened to a very interesting and thought provoking talk given by Bobbie, a worker for Women's Aid. This is a national charity working to end violence against women and children. Bobbie had worked for many years with Cicily Whitelaw, the founder member of the Dunfermline Branch and a much loved member of Holy Trinity Church.

Bobbie spoke about her work and revealed shocking statistics about the level of abuse that exists in Fife. She explained that when a woman plucks up the courage to ask for help they try to offer a safe refuge for her and any children.

Although they are funded by Fife Council they still do not have enough funds to provide safe refuge for all the women who require it. As well as giving financial donations, one of the ways we can help is to provide toiletries. They are greatly appreciated particularly if the victim has fled their home quickly without their personal belongings. Do you have any unwanted toiletries left over from Christmas? Did you bring home the bubble bath or soap from your last hotel stay or could you add an extra item to your shopping this week? If so please hand them in to Isobel Thomson who will arrange to deliver them to our local Women's Aid branch.

Dear HT Members, Fundraising (note by John Kennedy)

Those of us who have seen the projected budget figures for the current year will no doubt be as shocked and shaken as I was to see that we could be facing a potential deficit of up to £13,000. Such a financial situation is clearly untenable for any organisation and certainly requires urgent steps to try and mitigate our financial position.

There are two fundamental objectives :-

- Increase our membership
- Increase our overall giving and also devise other ways and means of raising funds.

To explore ways and means of meeting these objectives, Tim, our Rector, has decided to form two small groups — one to look at Mission and membership and the other to look at fundraising and our social activities. Tim has asked me to lead the fundraising group and I am joined on this new group by Jack Wardell, Helen Welsh, Pam Grimley, Jenny Stooke, Linda Sherwood and Sheona Wedge. The group will be called the "Fundrasing & Social Planning Group"

Our task will be to develop a range of fundraising mechanisms which we hope

will be supported by you, the congregation, and also to look at developing a social programme which will supplement and complement the ongoing good works undertaken by our existing social groups, i.e. the Wives Group, The Guild, the Young Church, the YF, Mothers Union and the Dorcas Group. As well as raising much needed finance our social activities also should be about enhancing fellowship within our congregation, utilising our assets e.g. our church and hall more fully and hopefully also attracting potential new members.

We have had our first meeting and , recognising seriousness of our finances, it is intended to establish as an urgent first step, a "50/50" Club which could potentially raise up to £3,000 per annum. The Club's members will pay £5 per month into a fund and if we can raise 100 members this would raise £500 each month. Half of the proceeds would go to the church and the other half would form a prize draw with two prizes of £200 and £50 available each month. Club membership will be open to friends, neighbours and family with the objective of reaching 100 members. We look to you, our church

members, to give this maximum support and also to recruit as many other members as we can. There is a bit of work to do to get the Club up and running and further details will be issued in the near future.

On the social side I have been asked by the Group to speak with representatives of the above groups to provide assurance that it is not the intention of our group to seek to disturb the ongoing plans of these groups but more to seek their ideas about enhancing our overall social programmes. Some of us for example would like to explore the possibility of forming a Men's Group and to that end we are planning to hold a Games evening for us boys. Nothing too energetic by the way.

We have had lots of interesting ideas already and we hope to share some of these with you in future bulletins. Your ideas will also be welcome. Meantime, please continue to support the coffee mornings and other social events already on our calendar.
