Pebbles on the Shore

Inevitably, because of my job, people, from time to time, ask me what I would like to be called - here are some random thoughts on the question of 'names'.

I always like to call a spade a spade! This is for the simple fact that a spade is a spade! The question is, however, would it be a spade if we called it a fork? Would it be a spade if we called it a duck-billed platypus? Is there some property of 'spadishness' about a spade which means that it will always be 'spadelike'. whatever we may choose to call it? Or, is a spade simply a spade iust because that's what we happen to call it? Who cares!? You might say, and you'd probably be right!

However, a similar question could be asked in a rather different way about our own names. Is there some pre-existing characteristic or quality of 'Timothy' that I display by virtue of bearing that name - or does the fact that I happen to be called 'Timothy' define the associations connected with the name - at least for those who know me?

That names do have associated



characteristics and qualities is without doubt - ask any parent trying to think of a name for their new-born baby and they'll probably tell you that whether they like or dislike any particular name is largely determined by the kind of person or people with whom they associate it. The name 'Sherlock' for example might be associated with a degree of detecting power, whereas the names 'Timothy' and 'Paul' are more likely to make you think of wit, intelligence and good looks - well, maybe not, but you know what I mean!

Names and the way in which we use them have also, traditionally been taken as an indication of the level of deference and respect, or otherwise, given to a person - although it's interesting that this has changed quite dramatically even in my own lifetime. When I was a child, my friends' parents always had to be called Mr Soand-so or Mrs What's-er'name. It

simply wasn't on to call them by their Christian names. Colin and Barbara always had to be Mr and Mrs Scott: Joan and Clarence always had to be Mr and Mrs Dawson, etc... Now, of course, things have gone to the opposite extreme. When my children were young, they called all of their friends' parents by their Christian names. Likewise. I would never dream of introducing myself to people as 'Mr Bennison', When people ask me what I want to be called, as they invariably do in my iob. I tell them to call me 'Tim'. Anything else makes me feel pretentious!

I guess that some of you probably don't like these changes - perhaps seeing in them a loss of respect for one's elders or an unacceptably high level of familiarity. But this, I think, is a sign of the times, and something that we're just going to have to accept - if not welcome. After all, respect is not something that can be assured by a name or a title. Reverends, Very Reverends, Right Reverends. Professors. Doctors and even plain Misters all have to earn their respect. In the past there has been far too much pomposity and hypocrisy surrounding names and titles and it can surely only be a good thing that their importance has been reduced and their capacity to

guarantee status and respect questioned.

We live in an age of increasing equality and, more and more, it is by their actions that people are judged. Nowadays nothing is taken for granted and nothing is guaranteed - we all have to prove that we are worthy of respect before we can get it. And this is how it should be.

And so to all of you, Bishops, Provosts and Professors; Doctors, Misters, Mistresses and Misses; to Tom Dick and Harry, to Tina Diana and Hyacinth - remember, that in the church at least, nobody has the right to pull rank or to claim superiority. We're all equal in the sight of God and therefore things like names, titles and hierarchies should be irrelevant - so don't let anyone tell you any different!

CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE CHURCH

I would like to thank all those who have made financial contributions to our Church over the past twelve months. The Vestry is grateful for your support in managing the business of the Church.

The monthly envelopes, for those who use envelopes for their donations, will be available within the next two weeks. If anyone else would like a pack of these envelopes, please let me know.

It is important that everybody reviews their contribution each year as costs of running the church escalate.

I would like to remind those who have made Gift Aid Declarations that they should use envelopes, bank standing order or cheques so that the contributions can be recorded and collated. This enables a tax claim form to be compiled and sent to the Inland Revenue.

If you are a taxpayer and have not made a Gift Aid declaration the beginning of a new financial year is a good time to sign up. It is very simple. The only requirement is that the tax that can be reclaimed by the Church must not exceed the amount of tax you pay. Your contributions need not be a fixed amount. You can vary the amount according to your circumstances. Each year you will be sent details of your total contributions so that if you receive a tax form you can fill in the details of your Gift Aid contributions.

Fundraising and Social Planning Sub-Committee Progress Report

The Sub-Committee has had two meetings and has drawn up some ideas for social events and for raising much needed additional funds. Inside your magazine you will find a questionnaire which sets out a proposed outline programme of social events which the committee hopes will provide something for everyone. We want to know your response to the various activities and events listed and, equally important, we also want to know your ideas. The activities listed will be in addition to our normal coffee mornings and other events. Please help by indicating which events you would like to support (the dates shown are indicative only).

With regard to the proposed 50/50 Club, it is essential that we gauge support for this fundraising mechanism which is in fairly common use by various organisations and churches in and around the Dunfermline area. Points to note are:-

1. The Vestry has now approved a constitution for the 50/50 club. The Club will be managed by a committee of 4 people initially appointed by the Vestry and thereafter elected at the AGM of the Club.

Subscription will be £5 per month and members can pay for additional memberships if they so wish.

- 3. Target membership will be 100 and if individual members take on additional memberships then this will help considerably in attaining our target.
- 4. Monthly draws will be held on the first Sunday of each month.
- 5. Prizes will be dependent on monies collected and will be three in number –two prizes of equal amount with a third, smaller prize. For example if we achieve 100 members, funds raised would provide for two prizes of £100 each and a third prize of £50.
- 6. Subscriptions will be payable monthly and to help minimise administration, payment via Standing Order is preferable but payment can also be made in cash.

The benefit to Holy Trinity will be £3000 per annum if we can reach our target of 100 members.
