Pebbles on the Shore

Well, Easter's past, and there's nothing now between us and those long hot balmy days of the Scottish summer - well . . . except for the Scottish weather! For some, the holiday season has arrived already, and over the next weeks and months, I'm sure there will be some notable absences from Church as people escape from the frozen North to warmer climes, or just for a break from the routine of ordinary life.

Holidays are funny things. They always seem to be over far too quickly - and then afterwards, the memory of them fades rapidly, and it feels like they were almost a dream - a time out from reality - and I suppose that's exactly what they are.

But we all need time out from the ordinariness and mundanity of everyday life from time to time. Reality's all very well, but you can have too much of a good thing, and if we had to live with it 52 weeks a year, I think it would drive us all mad. We all need the chance to escape - and holidays are one way of doing this.

Of course, there are other ways watching a film, for example, or reading a novel - or perhaps, just in the imagination. I sometimes like to think of myself as the hero



in a situation - landing a stricken aircraft, maybe, or providing the key to world peace! Which probably means I'm somewhat disturbed!

For some, Church is an escape from reality - it's a chance to leave behind the present modern ways of thinking, and enter into a mindset or world view which is altogether different. In fact. Anthony Freeman, in his book called God in us (which got him sacked by the then Bishop of Chichester) likens the experience of going to church to the Sealed Knot Society. The Sealed Knot Society, for those of you who don't know, is a band of people whose hobby is to come together at the weekend and immerse themselves in the world of the English Civil War. In doing so, they adopt the dress, language and social organisation of Seventeenth Century England and relive the experiences of Cavaliers or Roundheads in

ancient battles, such as Naseby or Worcester.

Well, perhaps that's a bit extreme, but it's easy to see what he means especially in those churches which still use the traditional language of the Prayer Book.

For me though, Church is the one place where we shouldn't leave reality behind - because, for our faith and worship to remain relevant and meaningful, to us and others, it surely has to be rooted in the reality of our experience of life. We shouldn't see our faith as an escape from the trauma and pain of everyday life. Neither should we use our belief that God is in control, and that all will work out for the good in the end, as a basis for absolving ourselves of responsibility for our own lives and those of others.

Rather, our faith calls us to play an active part in the world around us - ministering to one another, standing up for the marginalized and oppressed, and fighting for justice and truth in whatever way we can. Far from escaping from reality, we must engage with it reflecting, as we do, that love and compassion, which we believe to be at the heart of that which we call God.

Young Church May Magazine

The Young Church has had a very busy time recently. On Mothering Sunday they met early in the morning to eat bacon rolls and prepare posies to distribute to the congregation. The children took an active part in the service doing the readings, intercessions and collection. A few of the children also took part in the service on Palm Sunday. This was a particularly emotive service and many of the congregation commented on the maturity of the children and were impressed by the way the youngest ones seemed to understand and react to the occasion appropriately.

On Good Friday the children again met up with some of their friends from St. Serf's in Burntisland. The format was slightly different this year as we began with lunch. After some prayers and reflection we shared a hot cross bun and talked about the reasons we have them at Easter: the cross of Sacrifice, the yeast, a sign of Christ rising again and the fruit, the good things in life that God provides. Each child then read a small part of the Easter story up to and including the crucifixion. Activities this year included a very striking Good Friday collage. Stained glass window crosses, Cross bead necklaces, pictures of New Life, an Easter Timeline, our Easter Garden and of course decorated eggs and biscuits. We then went up to the church for a short service of reflection. We had several children come along for the first time this year and we were really pleased to see members of the Youth Fellowship continue to come along and help us. Some of them have been to a Good Friday Happening for 14 years now! Thank you to Gill for all her help with gardening and gluing and Agnes for the Easter bonnets with bells on them!

On Easter Day we had several visiting children who helped to complete the Easter story by adding the final stages to the Easter timeline. They then took advantage of the sunshine to hunt for eggs in the Church garden before returning to the hall to have an egg and spoon race.

On the 17th April the Young Church organised an Angel drive. The evening was very noisy and highly competitive. The two winners with shining halos were lain and Fiona (though it has since been discovered that the halo of one of them was tarnished!) Lesley and Barbara were the two whose halos had slipped a bit with slightly lower scores. £150 was raised for Church funds and a good time was had by all.

Fundraising and Social (F&S) Update

Our first social event on our programme, the Young Church Angel Drive was an outstanding success and we had a full house in terms of attendance and the mix of young and not so young "shaking it" together with great gusto was wonderful to behold. In all the evening was most enjoyable and raised the sum of £150 for church funds.

Also of note recently were our sponsored slimmers whose virtuous efforts over Lent raised almost £200.

Our next event is scheduled to be a "social walk" which we are planning to hold in mid to late May. We will be looking at several of the Loch Leven walks to select a suitable "course".
