Pebbles on the Shore Random Reflections from the Rector

One of the things that distinguishes the Scottish Episcopal Church (and, indeed, all Anglican Churches around the world) from most other churches is that we have no formal creed or statement of faith to which we expect members to sign up. Whereas the Presbyterian Churches, including the Church of Scotland has a statement of faith dating from the Reformation, called the Westminster Confession of Faith (www.reformed.org/documents/ wcf with proofs/), the Roman Catholic Church has its huge Catechism (www.christusrex.org/ www1/CDHN/ccc.html) and most Baptist and other independent churches have their own individual statements of faith, the Anglican Church, including the Scottish Episcopal Church has no statement of beliefs in order to define its faith or to enforce its beliefs on its members.

In fact, the most that is expected of Anglicans is that they feel comfortable with the ancient, ecumenical creeds of the Church: particularly the Nicene Creed which we recite each Sunday at the Eucharist; and the Apostles'



Creed which is recited at Baptisms and Confirmations, and whenever we have a traditional service of Evensong. Even then, there are no rules about how these creeds should be interpreted and whilst some understand them literally as a set of propositional statements to be believed, others regard saying them more in terms of an affirmation of loyalty or commitment to the Church Community and its history and tradition.

Rather than our faith being shaped by creeds and statements of belief, the primary factor in shaping our faith is the liturgy. To put this, pretentiously, into Latin, this principle is known as *lex orandi, lex credendi* which means 'The law of prayer is the law of faith'. In other words, the most important thing is our spiritual lives - our experience of God, our connection with each other, our prayers and our

liturgies. We don't first of all work out what we believe and then work out how to pray accordingly. Rather, our religious practice (or praxis) is primary and our beliefs are a secondary thing which emerge from it.

And, of course, to help us in all of that, we have the three 'lynch-pins' of Anglicanism: Scripture, which expresses the changing and evolving faith and experiences of the Jews and Early Christians; Tradition, particularly the Early Church Fathers and the ways in which they made sense of things; and reason, the way in which we make sense of things in the light

of our knowledge and understanding of the world in the present day.

Sadly, at a time when the Anglican Church is facing both serious internal divisions, and, what some would call, interference from outside, there is increasing pressure for us to define our faith and to make it clear who's out, and who's in.

On the contrary, our traditional lack of definition, our freedom to explore our faith and experience and to come to our own answers is, for me, and I think many others, absolutely vital. Without it, I fear I wouldn't be able to stick around very long!

Liturgical Corner Part 4

Liturgical Colours

Some Vestments, such as the stole and the chasuble, along with some other church 'hangings', including the altar frontal and the pulpit fall, come in a variety of colours. These different colours are associated with different season of the church's year.

Thus, in Advent (the four weeks before Christmas) and Lent (the six weeks leading up to Easter), purple is used as a sign of penitence and reflection in preparation for the big festival approaching. Purple is also a symbol of mourning, and is used at funerals and on All Souls' Day.

At Christmas and Easter, and for a few weeks following these festivals, white or gold is used as a sign of celebration and festivity (white is a symbol of purity) White or gold is also used on some special feast-days or Saint's days - for example, on All Saints' Day and Trinity Sunday as well as on 'Feasts of the Lord' like the Epiphany, and feasts of Mary, like the Annunciation.

Red is a sign of blood, and symbolises suffering and martyrdom. It is used for almost all the feasts of the apostles, on Pentecost Sunday, on Palm Sunday (when the Passion of Jesus is remembered) and, in some places, on Good Friday.

Green is the 'ordinary' colour (the colour of the earth, the colour of plant-life), and is used at 'ordinary' times of year, when none of the other colours are appropriate. Green is generally used from the Sunday after Trinity Sunday (usually in late May or June), through to Advent Sunday (at the end of November/beginning of December), with the occasional splash of white or red when a Feast Day is celebrated.

ELECTIONS

The Rector writes:

As many of you will know, Holy Trinity's AGM is fast approaching, and will take place after the 11.00 am service on Sunday 6 December. One of the tasks of the AGM is to elect people to a number of offices within the Church; and nomination forms will be available in the Vestibule from



Sunday 8 November for this purpose. This year, rather than adding the names of nominated candidates to a list there are separate proposal forms for each nomination so when you fill in your nomination form please ensure that each form has only one name on it and that you have clearly shown to which position that person is being nominated.

There are four 'offices' to which we need to elect people: Lay Representative (one position), Alternate Lay Representative (one position), People's Warden (one position) and Vestry member (two positions). If more nominations are received than the number of positions available in any office (e.g., if there are, say, five nominations for vestry member where only two positions are vacant) then we will have a vote. This will take place by secret ballot.

In order to make things clearer, I have included below a brief 'Job Description' for each office. If you need more information, please speak to me, or any member of the Vestry.

Lay Representative

The task of the Lay Rep, who is elected to serve for a period of one year, is to represent the congregation, along with the Rector and other clergy, at the Diocesan Synod. The Diocesan Synod is the decision making body for the Diocese and consists of the Bishop, all instituted and commissioned clergy and all Lay Reps. Synod meets usually

about twice a year. Lay Reps area also eligible for election at Synod to by a Diocesan Representative at the General Synod which meets once a year. At Holy Trinity, the Lay Rep is a member of the Vestry *ex officio* and attends our monthly Vestry meetings at which he or she plays a full part but has particular responsibility for reporting and explaining matters to the Vestry which have come from, or are concerned with, the Diocesan Synod. Finally, the Lay Rep is a member of the Area Council which meets several times a year.

Alternate Lay Representative

The Alternate Lay Rep is elected for a period of one year and steps in when the Lay Rep is unable to fulfil his or her duties for one reason or another. This usually means attending one of the Synods or an occasional meeting whilst the Lay Rep is perhaps ill or on holiday. The Alternate Lay Rep is not a member of Vestry.

People's Warden

The People's Warden is elected for a period of one year and (along with the Rector's Warden who is appointed directly by the Rector) fulfils a variety of tasks and has particular responsibility for the fabric of the building and related things, and for 'keeping order' in church. In practice, 'keeping order' means making sure people are greeted and welcomed to services, and making sure things run smoothly. At Holy Trinity, among other things, this involves making sure the sound system is running properly and directing and assisting people to Communion. The People's Warden is also a member of the Vestry *Ex Officio*.

Vestry Member

Vestry members are elected for a period of three years and attend monthly Vestry Meetings. The Vestry has overall responsibility for the day to day running of Holy Trinity, and for looking after its finances and property



PRAYER IN UNITY GOES LOCAL

One of the exciting legacies of David Campbell's tenure as rector was the creation of an inter-church prayer group 'Prayer in Unity'. This was initiated by Holy Trinity just over four years ago, initially involving St Margaret's Roman Catholic Church, Viewfield Baptist Church and St Margaret's Touch Parish Church. It soon involved other parish churches such as Limekilns and Kelty as well as people from other denominations such as the Link and Liberty Churches. The idea of the group is simple, to Pray for the Dunfermline and West Fife area (and all those living and visiting).

It has continued from that starting point and, though the numbers attending have gone up and down, there is always a group from a variety of churches – indeed people from at least ten denominations have attended at one time or another. The group is based on the principle that is possible to pray by becoming open to the Holy Spirit. This can create a very potent atmosphere which feels thoroughly enjoyable and relevant. (It does not however require that everyone present needs to pray aloud.)

Recently it was decided to move out of the Dunfermline centre and circulate around the towns, villages and population centres, in partnership with people from local churches who are interested in joining the session or providing local themes for prayer. This started in Inverkeithing and the Eastern Expansion, in conjunction with Baptist and local parish churches. Currently the group is meeting in Kelty. In September there was a tremendously exciting meeting there when around fifteen people came from the local parish church, joined by people from a number of other churches in Dunfermline and West Fife. The session was warmly introduced by Lee Messenger, the local Minister. The second Kelty meeting will be on Tuesday 3rd November in the rooms of Kelty Parish Church. You are welcome!

The Prayer in Unity Newsletter is available together with other information on coming meetings. People from some churches, such as the local Methodist Church, have regularly included the prayer themes which arise, as part of their Sunday services.

Following the meeting in Kelty the group will meet in Saline.
