Pebbles on the Shore Random Reflections from the Rector

One of the parts of our Sunday liturgy that many people at Holy Trinity through themselves into with apparent energy and enthusiasm is the Peace.

Whilst in many congregations the Peace is either omitted or celebrated in a rather lacklustre, awkward fashion, at Holy Trinity, things are different – people move around the building, and, as well as the more formal handshakes, hugs and kisses are often in evidence too. In fact, at the Midweek Eucharist on Thursday mornings, people are so keen to exchange the peace with everyone that sometimes it can be quite dangerous to get caught up in the Mêlée

All of this tends to mask the fact that for some, even at Holy Trinity, the Peace can be a little awkward or embarrassing. For some, the informality and the threat of physical contact with people they don't know very well can be quite off-putting, and cause a degree of unease – and for newcomers, especially those not familiar with our liturgies, it can be quite a nerve-racking experience. And so, for those of us who approach the Peace with gusto and enthusiasm, it's perhaps important to



remember that not everyone feels so relaxed about it and to be sensitive to people's feelings.

Nevertheless, the peace is an extremely important part of our liturgy and, although there is a tendency to think it is a modern thing (and it has been revived somewhat in recent decades), it does, in fact, have ancient origins.

Even in the New Testament, there are a number of references to the 'kiss of love' or 'holy kiss' (see, e.g., Romans 16:16 or 1 Peter 5:14). Later, and certainly by the middle of the 2nd Century, there is evidence that the Kiss of Peace had become associated with the Offertory – where it is still placed today in our Blue Book Liturgy.

Liturgically and theologically, the Peace carries at least two significant meanings. The first is a liturgical response to Jesus'

command in Matthew 5:23f that we should make peace with any with whom we have fallen out before offering our gifts at the altar. This explains why the Peace is placed just before the Offertory – i.e., just before the gifts of bread and wine are offered to God for use in the Eucharist, along with the money which is offered for God's service. The Peace is also an affirmation and celebration of our community, and of the fact that we don't worship alone, but in fellowship with others.

It's all too easy, often, to focus only on our own individual relationship with, and response to, God - 'my sins', 'my repentance', 'my prayers' etc, and to forget that the very nature of the Church is community. We worship not just as individuals before God, but as the people of God, or the Body of Christ. In the Eucharist, in particular, we offer, not only ourselves, but our whole worshipping community to God's service and, in listening to God, we seek not only our own individual calling, but our collective, or corporate calling too.

The Peace, therefore, is a way of recognising and celebrating all of this, within the context of our liturgy and, as such, is an extremely important element

within our service.

Some of you might be relieved to know that within the Anglican tradition in the UK there is no longer any expectation that the Peace will actually involve kissing one another (others may be disappointed, of course!) This perhaps would be rather too much for our reserved British manners, though in some parts of the world this would be quite normal.

The important thing is that, one way or another, we exchange a sign of peace with one another and, around the world, this is usually done in whatever way we would normally greet each other on civil occasions. In Scotland. this will normally mean a handshake, accompanied by the word 'peace' or the words 'peace be with you'. Though, of course, as many do at Holy Trinity, it is quite permissible to kiss or hug those close to us. And, for the record. I'm told that the difference between a normal kiss and a holv kiss is about 90 seconds!

CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE CHURCH

I would like to thank all those who have made financial contributions to our Church over the past twelve months. The Vestry is grateful for your support in managing the business of the Church.

The monthly envelopes, for those who use envelopes for their donations, will be available at the end of the month. If anyone else would like a pack of these envelopes, please let me know.

It is important that you review your contribution each year as costs of running the church escalate.

I would like to remind those who have made Gift Aid Declarations that they should use envelopes, bank orders, or cheques so that the contributions can be recorded and collated. This enables a tax claim form to be compiled and sent to the Inland Revenue.

If you are a taxpayer and have not made a Gift Aid declaration the beginning of a new financial year is a good time to sign up. It is very simple. The only requirement is that the tax that can be reclaimed by the Church must not exceed the amount of tax you pay. Your contributions need not be a fixed amount. You can vary the amount according to your circumstances. Each year you will be sent details of your total contributions so that if you receive a tax form you can fill in the details of your Gift Aid contributions.
