Pebbles on the shore

"Once upon a time, in a land far away, a beautiful, independent, self-assured princess happened upon a frog as she sat, contemplating ecological issues on the shores of an unpolluted pond in a verdant meadow near her castle.

The frog hopped into the princess's lap and said: 'Elegant Lady, I was once a handsome prince, until an evil witch cast a spell upon me.

'One kiss from you, however, and I will turn back into the dapper, young prince that I am and then, my sweet, we can marry and set up housekeeping in yon castle with my mother, where you can prepare my meals, clean my clothes, bear my children, and forever feel grateful and happy doing so.'

That night, as the princess dined sumptuously on a repast of lightly sautéed frog legs seasoned in a white wine and onion cream sauce, she chuckled to herself and thought:

'I don't think so!'

To be free of the need to fulfil other people's expectations or demands can be a very liberating experience. It's so easy to be less than ourselves as we try to please those around us and to get their approval or acceptance; and this, ultimately, can diminish who we are and stifle our self-expression.

To free others from our expectations and assumptions about them is also



liberating, both for them and for us and helps us to see and relate to people as they are in themselves and not in terms of what they can do for us.

The same is true in our church community. If we want to see growth and keep our message relevant to those around us we sometimes have to look beyond our traditions and the things that people expect of us, to new possibilities, new ways of being. Likewise, we sometimes need to free church from the things we expect from it and need it to be so that it has the space to grow and become something new.

Jesus' resurrection was a complete surprise; it fitted none of the cultural or religious hopes or expectations of the time, and it continues to be a surprise and a challenge for us in our scientific age.

Sometimes it's a good thing for us to surprise each other too!

The Prayer Group.

The Prayer Group, which ran weekly during Lent, will continue after Easter, but will now take place at a more extended interval. The Tuesday afternoon sessions will again be from 2,30pm to 4pm in the church hall. They will be on the first Tuesday of each month, starting on the 3rd May. However, there will now also be evening meetings. The first of these will take place on the 4th Wednesday of this month, the 25th May, from 7.30pm to 9pm in the church hall. In June, July and August the meetings will take place on the 3rd Wednesday of each month. We hope that, by offering evening meetings, we will open up the group to those who work during the day or who are not available on a Tuesday afternoon.

Nonetheless there is nothing to stop people attending both or opting for a different time occasionally if they miss their usual meeting time. Also, we would like to emphasise that you are equally welcome to join in, whether you are a regular member or an occasional one

Having got this more official business dealt with let us look at what we have been doing and what the group has meant to its members. Each session we start by calming ourselves and opening ourselves up to God by listening to some peaceful music. We have then used different methods of praying, for example following more formal intercessory prayers, or praying through scripture, involving ourselves as participants in scriptural stories, reading meditative passages and praying through cards, allowing God to speak to us through pictures. During our final meeting before Holy Week we followed the Stations of the Cross as seen through the eyes of Mary, the mother of Jesus. Each time we tend to use different methods of 'connecting' with God -there are a good number we have not vet tried. There is nothing complicated about it - prayer is much simpler and more exciting than many of us think. Each meeting ends with tea/coffee and a relaxing time chatting, extending the sense of companionship we have felt during our time of prayer.

What has it felt like? For me it has been a peaceful interlude in an often stressful life and given me a warm sense of connecting with God in a companionable and meaningful way. I will now pass on comments from some of the other members of the group

'It is good to have the extra focus and dynamism of group worship and still have your personal space respected.'

'The introductory music and the stillness of the group give me a sense of an intimacy between us and the presence of the Lord.' 'It is very spiritually fulfilling and I would like to say to those who have not been there, why not give it a try next time!'

So, why not respond to that call and come and join us!


