Our son was born on Remembrance Day and recently he has been declaring (with a degree of glee which we worry onlookers might find disrespectful) that his birthday is marked across the nation, by two minutes silence. We have been keen to dispel this misconception and demand a more sombre and respectful

response but it's not altogether easy to explain, *meaningfully* to a soon-to-be eight year old who has grown up in a democratic society where for example, civil safety and freedom of speech are taken for granted, the significance of Remembrance Day.

When asked, 'what is the silence really about?' he'll say that it is about remembering

soldiers who have died in the 'wars'. (Thankfully) he doesn't have any true understanding of war or death. So I remind him that there are children his age in this county who have lost fathers, uncles, grandfathers in modern conflicts and that he has relatives with memories of those lost in some of the conflicts of the twentieth century. I help him see that it is right to remember with deep respect, the ultimate sacrifice these people made defending our freedom and democracy; standing against tyranny and oppression. I try to instil in him

an appreciation of the freedoms we enjoy compared with the cruelty, persecution and subjugation that sadly still exists in other parts of the world today.

Then our fourteen year old daughter (who has recently been studying Wilfred Owen's 'Dulce et decorum est') chips in "but war is horrible. Wars are started by those who want power. Both sides get innocent people killed." What can I say to her? I can remind her that is why we recall the loss. And in remembering we can resolve to work for peace with all the urgency and fervour we can muster. In remembering the awful reality of war we may, one day, stop it happening again.

As Jim comments in his letter on page 2, November is a month of remembering. We look back but we will soon start to look forward again. The last Sunday of the month marks the festival of Christ the King. A day for remembering that in Christ we find a different kind of power-broker. One who empowers the weak, strengthens the feeble, enriches the impoverished, inspires the indifferent – our Prince of Peace.

Dear Friends,

Carol's Wee Walk

Carol Smithard, Phil's daughter, has been planning for some while to raise funds for the RNLI and particularly in this year, 7th September being the 175th anniversary of when Grace Darling made her significant contribution to rescue at sea. Carol has set herself the target of raising:

£20,000

Her self-defined challenge is demanding and reflects the resolve she has for this effort. 'Carol's Wee Walk' will cover not only the traditional start and finish points of Land's End and John O'Groats, but will include Orkney and Shetland as well, a distance of around 1800 miles with all the wiggles planned. Shetland itself is over 100 miles from top to toe. She will visit 43 lifeboat stations on the way and if all this is not significant enough, will be climbing Snowdon, Scafell Pike and Ben Nevis and many of the other high points in the various hill groups she will pass through. The whole will take three to four months.

Her Wee Walk commenced on 10th August with the Shetland leg so that she could see where she is going since if this section was done at the end, it would be pitch black for most of the day and she wanted to see where she was going; important since she worked there for the whole of last year.

She started off from Land's End on 19 August and has now (25 Sept) reached the bottom of Snowdon covering a distance so far of just over 700 miles and raising a total of £6,329. At some time along this route she will be passing through Dunfermline, though when is not quite clear as flexibility is important against weather and other interruptions. Estimate is towards the end of October/early November as she is targeting 100 miles per week.

She has a Facebook site that is attracting hundreds of contacts every day and a Donation site for the Walk. She (and dad) would be more than happy to have more people following her progress and giving her remote support as well as receiving any donations that come her way for which she will be very grateful.

Focus on M.U. USA

The high rate of unemployment and under-employment in the United States has caused real hardship for families, including an increase in homelessness or families facing poverty. Responding to the overwhelming needs, Mothers' Union members in the USA have given their time, money, and talents to provide for the physical and spiritual needs of the homeless, the needy and the destitute in their communities.

Across a number of states, Mothers' Union USA members run soup kitchens and provide toiletries for the homeless and families in need.

At Christ House, a homeless shelter with about 60 occupants, Mothers' Union USA members serve hot meals. Another Mothers' Union group serves three-course meals to approximately 40 to 50 people every month as Community Dinners. Non perishable goods are distributed to them after the dinner.

At Sophia House, home to approximately 32 women affected by domestic violence, Mothers' Union USA members offer hot lunches as well as providing toiletries for the women, many of whom arrive at Sophia House with only the clothes on their back having left a dangerous situation in a hurry.

Mothers' Union USA are a continued source of support for the sick and elderly members of the community and over Christmas will always prepare and deliver baskets of cheer to each one.

The current economy has also imposed a negative impact on the financial provision of some families especially towards the education of their children. Some Mothers' Union groups are providing school supplies for students while others are offering scholarships.

Mothers' Union USA lead baptism classes for parents and godparents, whilst also donating Bibles to confirmation candidates. In the festive season, Mothers' Union USA provides gifts and necessary items for orphans and needy children. M.U. members = 500

Saint of the Month St. Cecilia 22nd November

With Saint Andrew and also our beloved local Saint Margaret both being November saints there was no difficulty in finding a subject for this month's article. Either of these saints would have merited a rather lengthy article so I selected another saint who is important to us in Holy Trinity as a church with a musical tradition, but of

whom we are short on actual knowledge.

Saint Cecilia is the patron saint of music and musicians but whose real life is clouded in mystery because she was a martyr in the early church before written historical records were kept. To fill in any details of her life we are dependent on legends which may or may not be based on fact. The historical fact is that there were four - Saints Cecilia, Valerian, Tiburtius and Maximus - martyred at the same time. The year of their martyrdom is in doubt. It was at one time thought to be about 230AD during the reign of the Emperor Alexander Severus. Other evidence suggests that it is more likely that she was martyred in Sicily somewhere between 176 and 180 AD during the reign of Marcus Aurelius

The legend is that St Cecilia was the daughter of a noble Roman patrician and that she converted to Christianity and made a vow of chastity. Her family, however, decided that she should be betrothed to a Roman nobleman, Valerian of Trastevere. Before the wedding ceremony she told Valerian of her vow of chastity and said there was an angel watching over her who would punish him if he dared to violate her virginity but would love him if he respected it. Valerian asked to see this angel and she told him that were he to go to the third milestone on the Appian Way and allowed the Pope who would be there to baptise him he would be able to see the angel. He did so and along with Tibertius his brother, was converted.

Saint of the Month - St. Cecilia

Valerian and his brother then began a mission to bury Christians who had been martyred. Because of this they were arrested by the prefect, Turcius Almachius, and martyred themselves. Saint Cecilia collected their bodies and buried them and was herself arrested and condemned to death as a Christian. Initially she was condemned to be suffocated in a steam filled room but survived. She was then stabbed thrice in the throat and left to bleed to death, which took three days.

Her involvement with music, which was probably added to the legend after she was considered the patron of music, alleged that one of the factors that persuaded Valerian to become a Christian was the perfection and sweetness of her playing on the organ. It was also alleged that at her wedding she sang with joy and gladness knowing that Valerian would allow her to keep her oath of chastity and be a bride of Christ.

It is alleged that on her death bed she contacted the Pope asking him to make her home a church. In Trastevere there is a church dedicated to St. Cecilia built in the sixteenth century on the site of an earlier church said to have been St. Cecilia's home.

The first reference known to have been made to St. Cecilia as the patron saint of music was a music festival in her honour at Evreux in Normandy in 1570. In 1585 Pope Sixtus V gave formal approval to the foundation of the National Academy of St. Cecilia, one of the earliest musical institutions in the world.

Because of her patronage of music her feast day became an occasion for musical concerts and festivals. A lot of music has been dedicated in her honour ranging from Purcell (Ode to St. Cecilia), Handel (Ode for St. Cecilia's Day), Gounod (Solemn Mass for St. Cecilia) to Benjamin Britten who was born on her feast day. There are also many references to her in contemporary music. Simon(of Simon and Garfunkel) for example refers to St. Cecilia in his songs *The Coast* and *Cecilia*. She is also remembered in well-known poems by Dryden and Pope.
