September will see people living in Scotland facing the single, biggest political decision of a generation or even a lifetime. Our Bishop has written several articles recently stating that churches are best to remain agnostic regarding the question. Writing in the Herald

last year, Bishop David said "I believe churches should be agnostic – indeed should be absolutely determined not to have a view – on issues of constitution, flags and governance. In the membership of our churches there will be people on either side of this debate. They are entitled to hold and to express their views without finding themselves any more or less respected as members of our churches."

I very much subscribe to this view however I don't believe this means we should ignore what is, regardless of your stance regarding the actual question, a prodigious opportunity for the people of Scotland to engage in true democracy. I am heartened that the polls suggest that the turn out for the referendum will be very high and that people are taking part in the debate as there are other occasions when I feel we have become rather apathetic in terms of truly engaging with questions of democracy and community and

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as a society at times, can be perhaps rather individualistic.

For me, it also brings into sharp contrast, events in parts of the rest of the world; in Ukraine, Syria, Iraq, Afghanistan, Palestine and Israel to name a few. Places where there is little or no democracy, where fear, violence and oppression dominate. I feel thankful that I can only imagine what it must be like to live in such areas. I pray that as we each take the walk to our local polling stations on 18<sup>th</sup> September, we remember how fortunate we are and each of us pray for peace and democracy for all peoples of the world.

#### From the Very Rev'd Jim Mein

Dear Holy Trinity – I mean the congregation, not God – God presumably knows what I'm writing before I do – anyway.......

We have started on the process of looking for a Rector again but I want to write now about the immediate future. I think a year, or even perhaps two, between Rectors can be a very positive and creative time. It helps develop lay responsibility and leadership and it provides a time to take stock and discuss what the future may be.

To be honest I think we have done the first (lay leadership) better than the second (taking stock) and that is my fault. A group of us did in my first Lent look at congregational life from different angles but particularly since we started the process of advertising we have perhaps drifted a bit, expecting a result quicker than one seems to be coming.

Advent may be the official start of the Church year but in practical terms 'the Church season' tends to run from September to May. Our Young Church is just starting up again, the Mother's Union, the Wives group, the Prayer group and others begin their meetings. How do we want to grow? What do we want to be?

I'm trying to think how we might use the coming months so that the new Rector can come and find two communities, in their separate but mutually appreciative ways, ready to hit the ground running. There is so much good stuff at Holy Trinity that it can be a group who not only help their own members to deepen their lives, and not only a group who serve the surrounding community in a variety of ways, but also a group who give a great deal to the wider Church and world.

The truth is we will not survive by drifting. I know, as I said above, that many of you have been far from drifting – keeping the congregation going with the increased lay responsibility for

leadership has been hard work. And also of course many of you have very demanding work and family responsibilities. But perhaps as a community we need to be enthused, to be filled with that spirit which makes our Christian lives fulfilling. Being in the Church must not be an additional burden on busy lives but the well from which energy flows. Maybe we can think about that between now and Christmas.

#### St. Wenceslaus - 28th September

Saint of the Month St. Wenceslaus 28th September Most people when St Wenceslaus is mentioned are likely to think of carol singers and Christmas. Around a fortnight before Christmas, the doorbell would sound and on answering, one would be met by a

group of three or four youngsters singing Good King Wenceslaus. If they completed a full verse it might be worth tuppence and if when challenged, they actually knew the second verse (which was a rarity) they might even be given sixpence. St. Wenceslaus in real life, had nothing to do with Christmas and indeed was not a king, good or otherwise.

St. Wenceslaus was actually a Duke of Bohemia, who was born about 907AD. At that time Bohemia, which roughly equates to the Czech Republic of today, was Christian but only just – at that time the Pagan religion still flourished.

During that time, central Europe in the area of what is now the Czech Republic, Slovakia, Austria and Southern Germany, was a cockpit of independent dukedoms jockeying for position amongst themselves and at the same time having to repel attacks from the pagan Magyars and Polish Slavs advancing from the east. Wenceslaus defeated a rebellious Duke and defended Prague when it was attacked by King Henry I of the Eastern Franks. He was also able to maintain Bohemia's position by an astute foreign policy of changing alliances and payments of tributes to the King of Carinthia who in turn, paid tribute to the Magyars.

As a ruler of Bohemia, Wenceslaus was outstanding by the standards of that time. When most rulers lined their pockets by exacting onerous taxes on their subjects, Wenceslaus led a comparatively humble life and according to legend would go barefoot accompanied by just one servant to distribute food and alms to the poor. He also had a rotunda

built dedicated to St. Vitus and this today forms part of St. Vitus Cathedral in Prague.

His rule came to a sudden and sad end however, when in 935AD his younger brother Boleslav, wanting to take over as ruler of Bohemia, invited Wenceslaus to a church service to celebrate the feast of SS Cosmas and Damian. Boleslav picked a quarrel with his brother and on his way back to Prague after the service, three of Boleslav's henchmen attacked and assassinated Wenceslaus.

Wenceslaus was so loved by his people that they acclaimed him a saint almost immediately, and because of his reputation, the Holy Roman Emperor Otto I posthumously conferred on Wenceslas the title of king, and Pope Pius II several centuries later formally recognised him as a saint.

So what about the Christmas carol? It was written in America in 1853 based on a Czech folk poem and quickly became popular in America and England.

There is also a Czech legend that when the Czech people are threatened, the statue of St Wenceslaus in Wenceslaus Square in Prague will come alive and the Saint will lead an army of his knights said to be sleeping under Mount Blanik to fight and overcome any assailants (although it didn't seem to protect the Czechs for the

Germans in 1938 nor from the Russians ten years later).

St. Wenceslaus is the Patron Saint of the Czech Republic and his feast day of 28th September is a public holiday in the Czech Republic and has been adopted as the Czech National Day.
