

I had a great time, playing golf for a week with 31 other Episcopal Priests and then visiting my brother and his family in Dallas. Helen perhaps enjoyed her time even more, visiting many old friends and being taken into parts of the country most visitors do not see. We have lots of stories to tell each other.

But the thought I want to share is that I often find it difficult to admit to enjoying life. In Church year terms I think I find Lent easier that Eastertide. I guess part of the reason is that we see so much suffering in the world, but also in the States I was uncomfortable with all the 'conspicuous consumption' we saw (and shared in) that seemed to be over the top and beyond what should be reasonable in our world.

Of course it is right to be concerned about suffering and also to believe that a greater sharing of resources would be good for us all, but that should not stop us enjoying God's world. I believe the Church is called to show that the world God made is good, very good, and that we should celebrate all the good things. We may put on a superior smile as we think of Pollyanna always seeing the good in any situation but perhaps she had an important point. There were lots of wonderful things in both America and Malawi and I hope we will dwell on them rather than any problems.

This is God's world and I pray that for all of you, the good things in your life far outweigh the pains.

Playlist for Life – Retiring Collection 27 July

Playlist for Life encourages families and caregivers of a person with dementia to create a playlist of uniquely meaningful music on an mp3 player like an iPod and offer it at any time of the day or night. It is effective both at home and in residential care, at an early stage of the condition and later on.

There is mounting evidence that if people with dementia are offered frequent access to the music in which their past experience and memories are embedded, it can improve their present mood, their awareness, their ability to understand and think and their sense of identity and independence. Music that is merely familiar in a general way, although pleasurable, is not likely to be so effective.

The charity is chaired by Sally Magnusson, the journalist and broadcaster. Sally founded Playlist for Life in 2013, after being impressed by the effect of personally meaningful music on her late mother's dementia and then researching the evidence for her memoir Where Memories Go: Why dementia changes everything.

"I was lucky enough to hear Sally speak about her family's experience and Playlist for Life at the SECC. I was so inspired and it touched me personally as my father has been diagnosed with dementia.

My father is amazing. He worked as a teacher for more than 40 years and loved every minute. An immensely talented man, he helped hundreds of youngsters to fulfil their potential in music and drama, and brought joy to those who participated and those he entertained.

Dad is now 83 and continues to live happily with my mother. His mobility is limited, at times he feels claustrophobic and his deafness isolates him from his friends and to some extent us, his family. None of this is a huge problem as he is wonderfully cared for by my mother and is generally very happy and contented. Dad loved going to the theatre but the last few times we have taken him, he has been uncomfortable and asked to leave. He cannot really hear clearly and finds it hard in social situations as he does not recognise unfamiliar faces.

Music has always been important to Dad so, after listening to Sally, I asked my family to think about tunes from different stages of his life. We than got together and spent an evening making up a playlist including wartime favourites, musical numbers, pop hits and hymns. We downloaded the playlist to Mum and Dad's iPad and presented it to him on Father's Day.

Dad loves it. He has listened to it for hours, singing along, talking about where the music is from and who is performing, connecting it to productions he remembers. His joy is infectious. Dad's connection to the music is proof that this is worthwhile – to see his personality shine again is truly fantastic."

The children were also presented with commemorative 'Commonwealth' New Testaments to mark the Commonwealth Games being held in Glasgow this year. The New Testaments, printed by the Scottish Bible Society, contain a letter from Her Majesty the Queen and introduction explaining the modern-day Commonwealth. I was surprised to read that 60% of Commonwealth citizens are under the age of 30. The introduction also reminds us that "within its pages, the Bible encourages us to keep a big vision of what God is doing across his world." On the back cover is printed a quote by Andrew Motion, Poet Laureate (1999-2009):

"To read the Holy Bible is to feel simultaneously at home, a citizen of the world, and a traveller through eternity."

Saint for the Summer St. Swithun 15 July

The miserable wet weather that we had to endure in the early part of the summer has persuaded me to choose St Swithun, or as his

name is sometimes spelt St Swithin, to be our saint for this issue of the magazine in the hope that he might intercede for us to have a brilliant July and August!

St Swithun was born at or near Winchester about 800AD and entered holy orders as a monk at the abbey of Saints Peter and Paul the Old Minster at Winchester. At that time, the only educated people in the land were the clergy and because of this, the kings of the various kingdoms into which England was then divided, used members of the clergy as their advisers. King Egbert of Wessex, which at that time was the chief Anglo-Saxon kingdom, became acquainted with Swithun and used him as his confessor and adviser on spiritual matters and appointed him the tutor of his son, Aethelwulf. In this privileged position, Swithun prepared charters and legal document for the king, three of which are still in existence: one signed Swithun priest to King Egbert, a second Swithun Deacon and a third Swithun, Bishop. So we know that he was a very real person.

As a Bishop legend has it that, despite his position in the Court and his friendship with the King, Swithun was a humble man who travelled his diocese on foot rather than on horseback and that, when he ate in his hall, invited the poor and needy to the feast rather than the rich. He also persuaded the King to give a tithe of the Royal lands to support the Church. As a Bishop he was also extremely industrious in promoting the building of new churches in his diocese and repairing old ones, and he was instrumental in getting a bridge built over the River Itchen in Winchester. Another legend has it that he worked one miracle when a goose woman carrying a basket of eggs was set upon by workers on the bridge who maliciously broke the eggs - Swithun restored them.

Saint for the Summer - St. Swithun

When he died on 2nd July, 862, he was buried at his request in a simple grave at the entrance to his cathedral, the Old Minster, where it would be walked over by passers-by and be subject to the rains from heaven, rather than a shrine in the church. The grave swiftly became a place of pilgrimage and after a number of miraculous cures being attributed to him, Swithun was acclaimed as a saint. In 971 the powers that be decided to remove St. Swithun's remains to a shrine within the Old Minster church.

This was not without controversy between the abbey authorities who said the Saint had appeared in a dream requesting the move to take place, and those who wanted the Saint's last wishes to be respected. In the event, on the day the remains were moved, it poured with rain which lasted for forty days. This was latched onto by those opposed to the move saying it was St Swithun expressing his anger. This allegedly has given rise to the legend that if it rains on St Swithun's day it will rain for forty days but if its fine it will stay fine for forty days as in the proverb:-

St. Swithun's day if thou dost rain, For forty days it will remain St Swithun's day if thou be fair For forty days 'twill rain nae mare.

At the same time the Old Minster church which had been renovated to contain the shrine was dedicated to St Swithun instead of Saints Peter and Paul.

When the Old Minster church was replaced by the magnificent Norman Cathedral which continued the dedication to St Swithun, the Saint's shrine was



removed once again to the new Cathedral in 1093, where it remained until the reformation when it was removed at the dissolution of the monasteries by Henry VIII.

Saint for the Summer - St. Swithun

At some time in the middle ages the Saint's body was split and relics sent to various other churches. His head was detached and taken to Canterbury Cathedral and one arm was taken to Peterborough Abbey. All that now remains at Winchester Cathedral is a replica of the shrine.

St Swithun's Day is celebrated on 15th July, the date the body was transferred to the shrine in 971. It is included in the Anglican and Roman Catholic and Orthodox Calendars. For some unknown reason the Saint is also venerated in Norway where the cathedral at Stavanger is dedicated to him and where his day is celebrated on 2nd July. So let us hope the weather is bright and sunny on 15th July.

Meteorological note.: there is a scientific reason behind the superstition. The jet stream in mid July settles into a pattern that holds steady until about the end of August. On a year when the jet stream lies north of the British Isles then high pressure will predominate over

this period and conversely on a year when it lies south of the British Isles cold arctic air and wet Atlantic weather systems will apply.

St Swithun, needless to say, is the patron saint of meteorologists and prayers directed through him are said to be efficacious at times of drought.

Pam Lynn and Linda Brownlie have undertaken to explore the possibilities of an Organ Recital later in the year.

Vestry Matters

In order that other arrangements can be made, i.e. Young Church participation and the Retiring Collection, and keeping in mind the date of school holidays, the date of the Harvest Festival was decided on. It will be on Sunday 5th October.

A subgroup of Vestry has completed the 'Building grants and fundraising for building projects questionnaire' and we are grateful to Peter, Jack and Ken for completing this and ensuring it is sent off to the General Synod Office in very good time.

The Vacancy was once again under discussion. As agreed at a recent meeting with +David, 9 members of Holy Trinity Vestry and three representatives of St. Margaret, a group was set up comprising of Val Leslie (Lay Representative St. Margaret's) Elaine Cromwell (Rector's Warden Holy Trinity) and led by James Geldart (Holy Trinity), Jim and Ross will attend the meetings as appropriate. Their task is to update the material sent to would be applicants and to consider the advert that will appear in Church Times. Elaine had compiled a comprehensive report of the first meeting of this group. They will have met again before you read this report. Vestry also noted that due to another commitment +David had had to set a later date to meet with both Vestries. This meeting will now take place on 21st August.

Vestry agreed to request a work party of volunteers to tidy up the front forecourt of the church and Jack undertook to place the request in the service sheet for 29th June. It was also agreed to consider long term improvements for this area.

Ken informed us that the work to install the floodlighting had been completed. Further trials will ascertain the running costs of this and details of timing of the lighting will be available in due course.

Vestry Matters

The Rectory internal painting was progressing well and Ken was asked to gain a quote for painting the remaining external areas in order that a decision could be made setting this against the cost of replacing the woodwork with UPVC.

Ken was thanked for his work in organising all these items.

Elaine had provided a report of the last few weeks of Young Church sessions. She and the Young Church leaders were thanked for their commitment throughout the year.

Fay advised that there would be a Contact Group Meeting on 16th July.

Fay had received an idea for an event that could possibly take place near to Christmas. It was agreed to pursue this further with the person concerned.

Doors Open Day will take place on September 21st and once again Holy Trinity has been invited to participate.

The date of the next Vestry Meeting will be August 4th.
